PANEL 1: LAW ENFORCEMENT & POLICING

Hugh Currie

Detective Constable, Internet Child Exploitation Investigator, Guelph Police Service

Detective Constable Hugh Currie is a dedicated law enforcement professional with 25 years of service, specializing in the protection of children and the pursuit of online offenders. For the past 12 years, he has served with the Internet Child Exploitation (ICE) Unit, bringing deep expertise to complex digital investigations. Hugh is also a proud member of the Ontario Provincial Strategy to Combat Internet Crimes Against Children, a collaborative initiative focused on safeguarding youth across the province. As a team leader within the ICE Unit, he provides guidance, mentorship, and strategic direction in high risk, high impact investigations that protect the most vulnerable members of the community. Prior to working in the Internet ICE, he has worked Front line patrol and on the Tactics and Rescue Unit.

Julia Roizman

Police Constable, Toronto Police Service

PC Julia Roizman is a graduate of The University of Western Ontario and has been an Officer with the Toronto Police Service since 2014. PC Roizman was drawn to policing as a second career and is currently working as part of the Specialized Emergency Response Team in the Marine Unit.
